Upcoming Events of Interest

UPDATED! Saving Places 2006: Building on the Past, sponsored by Colorado Preservation, Inc.. Saving Places is the largest statewide historic preservation conference in the country. The conference will take place February 8-10 at the 1770 Sherman Street Event Complex in Denver, Colorado. The program features more than 160 national and regional preservation experts discussing current preservation programs, projects, trends and technology, as well as educational sessions, workshops, tours, networking opportunities, and the only trade show of preservation goods, services and products in the Rocky Mountain region. NEW! Historic Preservation Law and Section 106 Compliance Course. This course emphasizes legal compliance (the National Historic Preservation Act Section 106 process) through the use of actual case studies. It addresses legislation and the process to meet the requirements of the law. Course content includes, but is not limited to, the stewardship role, use of historic properties, and communications with related oversight agencies. This Interservice Environmental Education Review Board (ISEERB)-approved course is ACHP recognized, and the total course length is 24 hours. The course is scheduled for February 14-16 at Nellis Air Force Base, Nevada, April 18-20 in Denver, Colorado, and July 18-20 in Langley, Virginia. NEW! An American Indian Cultural Communication Course will be held March 7-9, 2006, in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Participants will learn about the DoD American Indian-Alaska Native Policy, implementation guidelines, and the skills required for improved communication and consultation with tribal governments. Evening cultural programs will also be part of the required course instruction. Seating is limited and registration is due no later than February 10. NEW! Introduction to Cultural Resources Management – Laws & Regulations Course. This three-day course provides an integrated overview of all pertinent laws and regulations needed to understand and fulfill cultural resource management responsibilities. The course is taught in conjunction with the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation, and the sponsor for this course is the Navy Federal Preservation Officer. This ISEERB-approved course is ACHP recognized, and the total course length is 24 hours. The course is scheduled for March 14-16 in Atlanta, Georgia, and August 15-17 in New London, Connecticut. The Advisory Council on Historic Preservation's course, **The Section 106 Essentials**, offers participants an in-depth look at historic preservation responsibilities under the National Historic Preservation Act. UPDATED! The Joint Services Environmental Management Conference will be held March 20-24, in Denver, Colorado. The theme of 2006 JSEM is *Transformation*, highlighting the many new and innovative ways the Department of Defense, other Federal agencies, states, the defense industry, and our partners are transforming how we are meeting our mission needs while protecting the environment. Two sessions related to DoD CRM are planned: "Integrating Cultural Resources and GIS: Asset Accountability and Management Opportunities" looks at increasing and standardizing the use of GIS for better cultural resources management. The "Managing DoD Cultural Resources" session is targeted at non-specialists working in the DoD CRM field, as well as professional managers overseeing CRM personnel and programs. It will include introductory presentations on the role of CRM in support of the military mission as well as updates from CRM professionals from all echelons talking about their work. RESCHEDULED! Archaeological Damage Assessment Class. This is the second phase of ARPA training aimed at Archaeologists who may need to do damage assessments under ARPA or ARPA-like situations. The class will be presented by Martin McAllister, ARI, Inc., from March 20-24, at Fort Hood, Texas. The class is open to all government, tribal and contract archaeologists. There are no prerequisites for the class. The maximum number of participants allowed in the class is 17 so interested archaeologists should register as soon as possible.
